
How to Clean Bevel

Nanotex® Fabric

Prompt cleaning is always recommended.

Recommended cleaning steps are listed by type of stain. For best results follow cleaning steps in order.

Recommended Care and Cleaning Guide:

1. Blot up liquids on the surface with a clean, soft towel.
2. Prepare a cleaning solution (see recommendations below).
3. Apply solution sparingly with a misting spray bottle. Work into affected area by lightly scrubbing the area with a soft-bristle brush. Make sure to rub from outside of stain inward so as not to spread the stain.
4. Rinse area thoroughly to remove all soap residue, as residue will attract dirt.

Repeat steps 3-4 as needed. Use a low-heat hair dryer or allow fabric to air-dry.

Cleaning Solution Recommendations:

Mix ½ teaspoon Tide® to 1 cup water for:

Tips and Tricks:

- Make sure to clean away excess mess first.
 - Use as little solution as possible.
 - Brush stains inward, not outward.
 - Use a clean white rag or paper towel (without design or printing).
 - Always use a dry section of the rag for soaking up liquids.
 - Be sure to rinse thoroughly, possibly multiple times.
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If Bleach Cleaning is Required:

1. Spray a 90% water/10% bleach mixture on the fabric and allow to linger for the time specified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
 2. Make certain to thoroughly rinse with clean water after bleach-cleaning to remove any residual bleach and pat dry.
