

## **Hinge** Detailed Cleaning Instructions

# **How to Clean Hinge**

## **Vertical Surface Fabric**

This fabric has an W-S cleaning code. Water-based cleaning agents and foam may be used for cleaning. This fabric may also be cleaned with mild, water-free solvents. Cleaning by a professional cleaning service is recommended.

### Recommended Care and Cleaning Guide:

### **Regular Cleaning and Maintenance**

We recommend using a professional cleaning service. Frequent vacuuming or light brushing with a non-metallic, stiff bristle brush is recommended to remove dust and grime and prevent overall soiling. Always test any cleaning method or cleaning agent on an inconspicuous area on the furniture. Several light applications of a cleaning agent are less harmful than a single concentrated application.

#### **Stains**

As with any stain, immediate cleaning care is advised. Blot the stain with a soft cloth to remove excess material. Spot clean the affected area with water-based cleaning agents and foam, or a mild dry cleaning solvent. Pretest a small, inconspicuous area before proceeding. Do not saturate the stain. Take care to clean spots or stains from the outside to the middle of the affected area to prevent circling on the fabric. Avoid excess scrubbing to prevent damage to the surface of the fabric.

#### **Bleach Cleanable**

This fabric may also be **SPOT** cleaned with a solution of 90% water and 10% bleach. Stains can be addressed by **SPOT** cleaning only as the bleach residue will need to be **FULLY** removed to prevent degradation of the fabric over time. Always test any cleaning method or cleaning agent on an inconspicuous area on the panel system.
